RE: Proclamation 104 – Suspending the Writ of Habeas Corpus Throughout the United States September 15, 1863

By Proclamation 104 Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States proclaimed and made known to all whom it may concern that the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus is suspended throughout the United States, and required all magistrates, attorneys and other civil officers with the United States and all officers and others in the military and naval services of the United States to take distinct notice of this suspension and it give it full effect, and that this suspension will continue throughout the duration if the said rebellion o until this proclamation shall, by a subsequent one to be issued by the President of the United States be modified or revoked.

I am one of whom it may concern, who understands that the rebellion Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States referred to is still ongoing and I am unable to find evidence of a subsequent proclamation from a President of the United States modifying or revoking Proclamation 104.

My efforts to seek Remedies of Law and other attempts to seek my rights under Habeas Corpus, under the Department of Justice, have been ignored. I am not an enemy of the states and thus I am attempting to seek redress under the provisions of Proclamation 104.

In the presence of the Lord God Almighty can you please confirm who I need to contact to be discharged in accordance with "An Act relating to Habeas Corpus, and regulating Judicial Proceedings in Certain Cases" of March 03, 1863?
